## Achieve 24/7 gives children a boost to succeed



One of the more gratifying things I do as County Executive comes when I interact with children. It's why I make sure to visit every school at least once during the year. It's also why we created Achieve 24/7, my initiative to break down barriers so that all children have the chance to succeed.

As part of the Achieve 24/7 initiative, I visited Oakland Mills Middle School last week for the signing of a Partnership Agreement between the Howard County Public School System (HCPSS) and the Office of the Local Children's Board. Among other things, this partnership will allow us to identify student human service needs, work together on a variety of community programs, combine staffs to support priority areas and share resources and programs to promote an inclusive culture that embraces diversity.

While at the school, I got to spend time with some of the 80 students who are voluntarily taking part in a summer math enrichment program. I also got to take part in a reading enrichment activity for some of the younger members of the community.

In addition to this activity, Achieve 24/7 is continuing its successful "Weekend Warrior Snack Pack" program in conjunction with the summer lunch program run by the Howard County Public School System. Last fall, Achieve 24/7 launched a school readiness program for children from birth to age 5, offering free educational videos to county families. Parents and guardians can sign up to receive the short videos by text message or email, demonstrating simple activities to do with children to increase school readiness.

## Community Resources Campus growing

We're moving forward with our Community Resources Campus, located off Patuxent Woods Drive in Columbia. The Department of Community Resources and Services, Department of Housing and Community Development, Office of Human Rights and Community Action Council opened at their new campus locations July 17. These agencies join 16 nonprofit organizations that have offices at the NonProfit Collaborative, a center located on the campus.

Next year, a state agency, the Howard County Department of Social Services, will also move to the campus.

It's long been my belief that co-locating key governmental and nonprofit agencies at the same campus will improve the delivery of services and quality of life for our most vulnerable residents at a critical time in their lives. Rather than spending hours, sometimes days, traveling throughout the county, residents will go to a single location for their needs.

## Main Street reopens to traffic on Friday at 5 p.m.

Ellicott City's Main Street will reopen to two-way vehicular and pedestrian traffic this Friday, July 20, at 5 p.m. Prior to the reopening, I will sign an Executive Order ending the State of Emergency 10 days sooner than authorized by the County Council.

I feel we can now safely reopen the entire street and our police officers will continue to have a round-the-clock visible presence. Contractor-only parking will be allowed on Main Street between Old Columbia Pike and Maryland Avenue. Only contractor-identified vehicles, or contractor vehicles with signage identifying their company and location of work, will be allowed to park in this area. There will be no restriction on the timing and it will be first-come, first-serve. For all other vehicles, no parking will be allowed except for short periods of loading and unloading.

Ellicott Mills Drive will remain closed until late fall while public works crews repair a culvert and portions of the road there. For more details, click [here](#).
